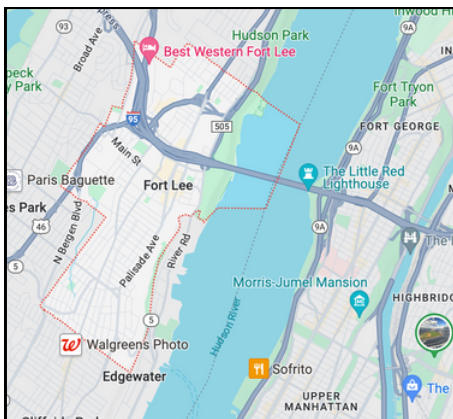

Location



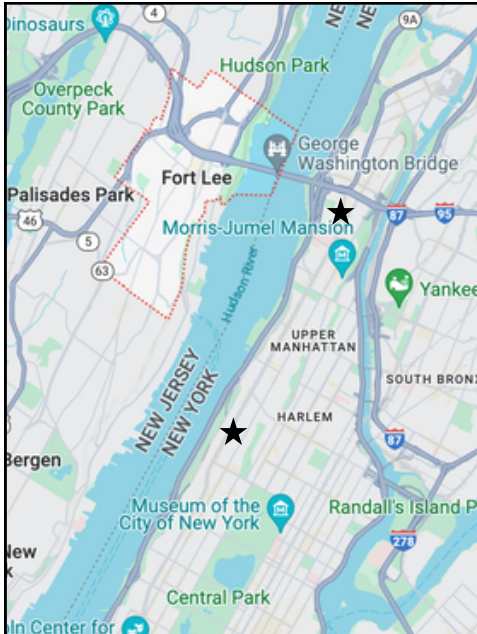
Fort Lee Map

Fort Lee is a borough in Bergen County, New Jersey. It is on the west side of the Hudson River across from Washington Heights and surrounds the George Washington Bridge on the New Jersey side of the river. It includes the bottom portion of Palisades Interstate Park, which stretches up along the Hudson in New Jersey.

Living in Fort Lee and Working at Columbia



Fort Lee is a great community to live in and an easy commute to Columbia.

Commuting by Car:

- Traffic during rush hour can be heavy across the George Washington Bridge, but once in Manhattan it is a quick drive to Morningside, Manhattanville or CUIMC campuses.

Commuting by Public Transit:

- New Jersey Transit buses go across the GW Bridge where you can take the A subway to 168th for the CUIMC campus. For the Morningside and Manhattanville campuses, you can transfer at 168th to the 1 subway.
- After crossing the GW Bridge, another option is to take the M4 or M5 bus to Columbia (all campuses).
- Columbia provides a shuttle between Fort Lee and the CUIMC campus which can be another method to cross the GW Bridge for commuters: [George Washington Bridge/Fort Lee Shuttle](#).

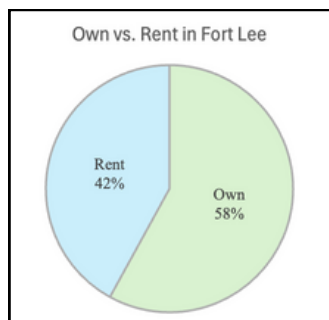

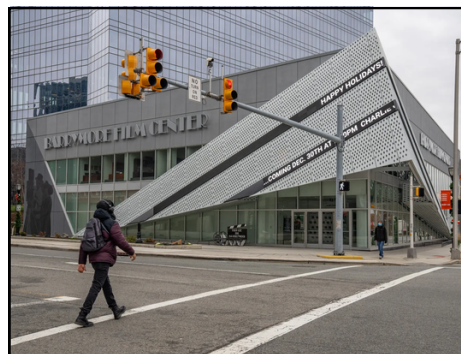

The Fort Lee Historic Park, part of Palisades Interstate Park, features scenic views as well as a reconstructed Revolutionary War encampment and small museum. There are also sometimes historical reenactment events here.

The Barrymore Film Center is a film museum dedicated to the history of the movie industry in Fort Lee. It also contains a theater which features both modern and historical films.

History

The first people to settle the land that is now Fort Lee were the Lenni Lenape tribe. In 1609, Henry Hudson first recorded the Fort Lee area in writing. In 1664, the British took control of the area, along with much of New York and New Jersey. During the Revolutionary War, Fort Lee, originally called Fort Constitution, was named for General Charles Lee. After the loss of Fort Washington across the Hudson, George Washington and his soldiers climbed the Palisades cliffs and encamped in Fort Lee. Soon after, the army was forced to retreat by the British and Thomas Paine, who was in Fort Lee at the time, wrote the famous line, "These are the times that try men's souls." It was not until 1904 that Fort Lee was officially designated as a borough in Bergen County.

In the early 20th century, Fort Lee was the site of many early motion pictures and studios such as Universal and Fox. Many film companies and stars such as the Marx Brothers got their start here, and Fort Lee is often referred to as the "Birthplace of the Motion Picture Industry." However, by the 1930s, most filmmaking had moved to California. In more recent years, many immigrants have created a diverse community in Fort Lee, featuring distinct neighborhoods such as one of the largest Koreatowns in the United States.
