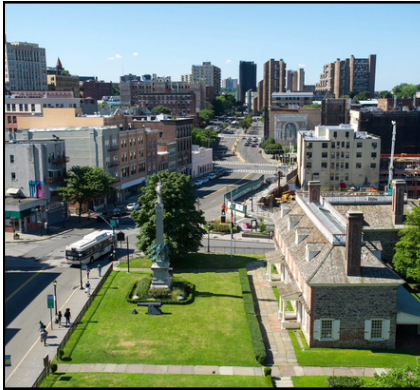


YONKERS, NEW YORK

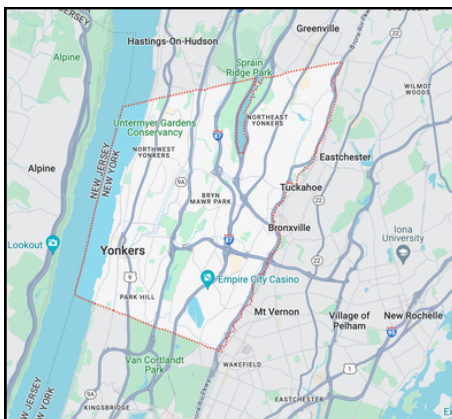

Location



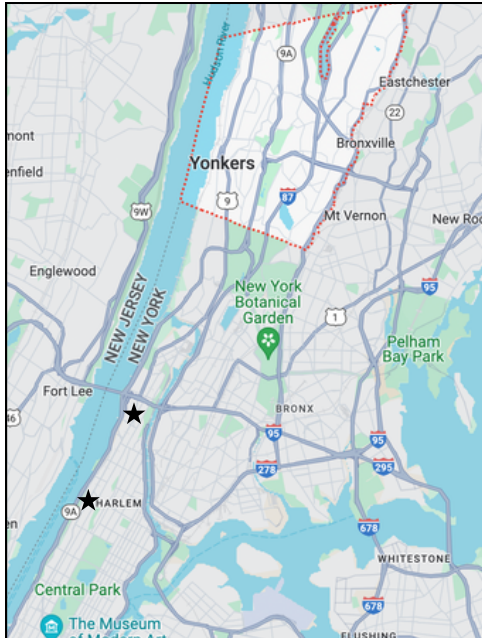
Yonkers Map

Yonkers borders Riverdale and Van Cortlandt Park in the Bronx, directly to the north. It is the most populous city in Westchester County. Yonkers includes both more urban and more suburban neighborhoods. It is west of Bronxville, Mt. Vernon, and New Rochelle, and south of Hastings-on-Hudson. The west side of the city borders the Hudson River with views of the Palisades.

Commuting to Columbia

Commuting by Car:

- Traffic during rush hour can be heavy on the Henry Hudson Parkway near the George Washington Bridge; however, other than that it is a quick drive to the Morningside, Manhattanville and CUIMC campuses.

Commuting by Public Transit:

- Public transit is very efficient from Yonkers. You can take the Metro-North Railroad to Marble Hill, 225th Street and then transfer to the #1 subway. For the Morningside and Manhattanville campuses, a similar-speed option is to take the Metro-North Railroad down to Harlem, 125th Street and then take the M60-SBS bus.

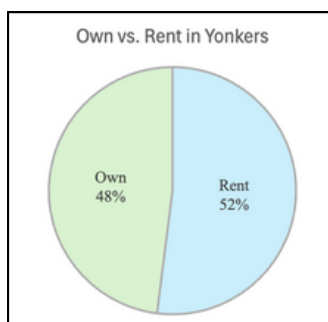

History

Yonkers was originally inhabited by Algonquin, Mohegan and Manhattes Native Americans. In the 1600's, after the arrival of Henry Hudson, the Saw Mill River, which flows through Yonkers, powered a mill belonging to a Dutch man named Adrian Van der Donck. His nickname was De Jonkheer, leading to the name, "Yonkers." The name stuck even after the land was taken over by the British.

In 1790, after the Revolutionary War, Yonkers was formally defined as a town in Westchester. As industrialization grew, many factories were housed in Yonkers, including one for the famous Otis elevator company. This high level of industry also led to many local inventions, such as FM radio. In 1867, Yonkers was declared a city. Today, it is diverse and growing, now the third most populous city in the state.
